KAIROS

A TIME FOR ACTION

2020 HAS BEEN A ROUGH YEAR for all of us. My head swims with all we have been through as a country: COVID-19 and the resulting illnesses and deaths, job losses, Hurricane Laura, racial tensions, windstorms and tornadoes, violence, wildfires, a feeling of grief and isolation as we continue to distance ourselves to protect our most vulnerable populations...and the list goes on.

Alongside all these happenings has been all the stress that life normally brings us...changes at work, health concerns, family concerns, and more...

Despite all this, God continues to walk beside us...and we are offered mercy, grace, and deep, deep love in the midst of what appears to be chaos...

A tiny virus has impacted our lives for months now. We live in a time of liminality. We know that scientists are working on a vaccine for the virus, but it has not yet been perfected. We are reminded that with Jesus, the Kingdom of God began breaking into the world, but it was not yet perfected. In ancient times, people expected that God's reign would happen quickly. In reality, the human race has struggled for many years to embody the love and compassion which Jesus taught us.

How can we live fully as people of God? Are we ready to let go of anger, anxiety, aggressions, and fear to allow God to reign? God has been inviting us into something new for a long time now.

Another liminal parallel has occurred in our spiritual lives in 2020. The spiritual patterns that we had established as "normal" have been disrupted. Something new has begun as our lives have been changed by this virus, but it has not yet been fully discovered. I wonder if God is inviting us into deeper communion with God/Christ/Spirit as well as more inclusive relationships with people everywhere.

Our most recent worship series at West Side Christian Church has been a study of the parables. Throughout the parables, God continually surprises us. In the ancient world, the Kingdom of

God was contrasted with a human kingdom. People of that time recognized all the inconsistencies that could occur when a human ruled. They experienced firsthand what could happen when a king succumbed to greed, power, and wealth. Jesus' parables described more of a Kin-dom than a kingdom. In this Kin-dom, everyone was "kin." Compassion and acceptance prevailed to a shocking level; even those who were culturally outcast were included. Jesus' descriptions often left people puzzled as they tried to grasp ways of being that were vastly different from the norm. His teachings threatened the status quo. They were life-changing.

In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets. ~Matthew 7:12

Our lives have been disrupted this year not only by a virus but by division within our country. In the United States, people are beginning to speak from their hearts about deeply held values. Rather than silently holding those values inside, they are speaking up for what they believe is right. Surprisingly, conflict and disagreement are often a prelude to creative resolution: chaos before calm. In the parable of the Samaritan, we were surprised by the heart-felt compassion of an enemy. Where are the compassionate surprises in our divisions today? What kind of stories would Jesus tell to help us discern how to move closer to Kin-dom living?

In the pages that follow, you will read the wisdom of West Siders who are journeying with God through this liminal time in our lives. May their spiritual journeys inspire your own as you look to God as the ground of your being.







I want what I see in those pictures, but will I embrace the process? Might the painful journey make the destination more glorious? Will I thank God for healthy produce even if I don't like beans?



VELVA MAXINE COUNSELLER, her husband, Jack, and their three daughters, Janet, Joyce, and Diane, were an active part of West Side for many years. Maxine and Jack participated in the Upper

Room Sunday School Class.

Maxine's upbeat attitude was a joy in the Christian Women's Fellowship (CWF), where she served as president and also as a group leader. She was one of the first women elders at West Side,

and she had a gentle presence at the communion table and as she visited the homebound. Maxine also served on numerous committees and taught Sunday School to the junior-age children. She was a good friend to many at West Side and will be deeply missed.

Maxine went to be with her Lord on Saturday, August 29. She was 99 years old. Visitation will be 1:00-3:00 p.m. Sunday, September 13, at Kevin Brennan Family Funeral Home, 2801 SW Urish Road. Funeral service will be 10:00 a.m. Monday, September 14, at the funeral home.

HADLEY HEAVIN (May 26, 1918-Dec. 7, 1941)

Hadley Heavin, Charlie Heavin's brother, received full military honors at his funeral at First Christian Church of Baxter Springs, Kansas, on September 5.

Governor Laura Kelly spoke, and Hadley's great nephew brought the message. The streets along the way to the cemetery were lined with townspeople waving flags as they honored Hadley. At the interment, the navy conducted military honors, bagpipers played, and two Blackhawk helicopters flew over.

Hadley died at Pearl Harbor while serving our country in the Navy and received the Purple Heart for his sacrificial service. In September 2019—after 78 years—Hadley's remains were identified.

We rejoice that Hadley is with our Lord and that his remains are finally with those of other family members in Baxter Springs.


VIRTUAL WORSHIP SERVICE & CLASSES


NEW DISCIPLES WOMEN COOKBOOK AVAILABLE
