All who cleanse themselves of the things I have mentioned will become special utensils, dedicated and useful to the owner of the house, ready for every good work. Shun youthful passions and pursue righteousness, faith, love, and peace, along with those who call on the Lord from a pure heart.

2 Timothy 2:21-22, NRSV

HOLY VESSELS...I've been pondering this phrase during our "Holy Vessels" Lenten worship series. In the Gospel of Matthew, as Jesus healed he was completing actions similar to what might have taken place in cultic temples of his time period (Wilson, *Healing in the Gospel of Matthew*). Instead of healing in a temple, Jesus healed people right where they were. Scholar Walter Wilson writes that Jesus himself is the embodiment of a temple. Jesus is a Holy Vessel...a container for all that God is. Jesus freely pours God's mercy, healing, grace, and justice on those around him and when he is depleted turns to God to be replenished through prayer.

If Jesus is a holy vessel, then we, who were created in the image of God, must be holy vessels also – created both to contain the love that comes from God, and to pour it out freely and without reserve.

Containers, whether made of glass or pottery, can be broken. Jesus' body was broken during his trial and crucifixion, yet his spirit remained free as he relied upon the Divine for strength and fortitude through that harrowing experience.

During the pandemic we have lived through a year of harrowing experiences. Too often our lives have been broken by grief, illness, fear, and a plethora of other feelings. Like empty bottles smashed and left for refuse, we have wondered if we will survive, yet God fills and replenishes our spirits. Like broken glass that has been tumbled and polished by ocean waves, we have been changed over the past year. Each time we rely on God, we are transformed a little bit more until, like beach glass, we become recycled treasure.

During Lent I invite you to think of vessels (containers) in your

life that have special meaning for you. Why is a certain container special? Often it is not a material object that holds meaning, but the memories we hold of that object. What do you find in your memories when you use a treasured object? Where is God in those memories? Is there a holy story or understanding connected to a vessel that you treasure?

For example, the soup pot pictured here is a holy vessel given to me by my sister many years ago. It holds nourishing food, as well as the bowls for serving that food. Just as we can become broken as we live all that life brings us, so one of the soup bowls is broken and glued back together. For me,



this soup set is a symbol of the gathered community, and God's love that we can share with people everywhere as we break bread together.

The robin's nest pictured on the front of the newsletter is one that is refurbished each spring on Gary and Norma Jantz's front porch. Last year Gary provided us with a photographic journey of what those tiny vessels called robin's eggs carried. Eventually, the vessels themselves were fractured, yet it was wondrous to witness the new life that emerged.

In other places in this issue of *West Side Times*, you will find pictures and stories of holy vessels in the lives of West Siders. As you think about these images, remember the holy vessels you treasure in your own life and that *you* are also a holy vessel.

No matter what has occurred over the past year, God holds us close, polishing our brokenness until we are restored as transformed treasure.

WHAT IS A LITTLE FREE PANTRY?

WHAT IS A BLESSING BOX?

A Blessing Box, or Little Free Pantry, is a "holy vessel" that contains free nonperishable food and other items such as hygiene products, school supplies, laundry detergent, or socks.



WHAT IS ITS PURPOSE? To fill an immediate need for families or individuals in the community and to provide a means to donate to those in need: take what you need, bring what you can.

HELP NEEDED TO BUILD WSCC BLESSING BOX

MOST OF US ARE AWARE that food insecurity is a very real problem for many in our community. Although West Side does not have the resources to solve this problem, we can be part of a movement that can help.

We'd like to join the Little Free Pantry Project by installing a free food pantry on the church property. The pantry would be stocked by members of the congregation and, hopefully, also by our neighbors who can afford to do so.

There are *lots* of different plans available for building one of these boxes. One source shows an estimated list of purchased materials from Lowes adding up to under \$300. It could be that some members of our congregation who like to build things have scrap materials on hand that could help keep the cost down.
